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Wardens' Report Vestry 2023

My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you. (John 15:12) New International Version

To the Members and Friends of the Parish of St. Luke's Leeds,

As God's children, we continue to live out our mission to love others as God loves us. We take this love into the world around us through our stewardship and care of the natural world and by loving our neighbours in the wider community.

In 2023 we have further built our relationship with the United Church communities at Olivet and Seeleys Bay where we worship on Sunday mornings. We have joined together for our advent retreat, a time for peaceful reflection, and for our Christmas Eve service. We look forward to further opportunities to join together in the coming year.

Environmental Outreach & Stewardship

Our Parish Advisory Council has continued to meet online which has limited our greenhouse gas emissions, thus limiting our impact on climate change. Our Re-New Creation Thrift Shop makes a significant contribution to stewardship of God's world and resources. Through our shop we encourage the re-use of various items, diverting items that still have life from landfills. Through our thrift shop proceeds and member donations, we've been able to provide financial support to the Westport EcoFest, Frontenac Arch Biosphere Nature Camp, and towards tree plantings in PEI as well as locally for the 160th Anniversary of the Diocese of Ontario, among other environmental initiatives. We are looking forward to planting more trees in our area this spring.

Community Outreach & Stewardship

In addition to the environmental activities supported through the thrift shop, we are able to assist people in our community with lower incomes and few resources to gain access to affordable clothing and other needs. We continue to assist trans students in the area to renew their wardrobes. Our Meals-to-Go Program continues to grow both from greater exposure and ongoing need, which is sadly on on upswing with high inflation on food and housing. In 2023 about 60 meals were distributed per week. We have expanded to include a regular community lunch at the Elgin Community Hall; a little over 20 meals were served each month. Our food security ministries this year have been greatly assisted by the grant that we received from the United Way Leeds & Grenville. Recognising the skyrocketing costs of living, in 2024 we are looking to expand our work to the ever-expanding housing crisis.

We continue to share that we are a welcoming community to all, especially the 2SLGBTQ+ community in our region. In addition to being visible members of Proud Anglicans, we have a PRIDE button that was designed by a local trans youth so that we can show our PRIDE throughout the year. We were present on the Saturday of Gananoque Pride in July and participated the their Pride Parade.

Thrift shop proceeds, JUG campaigns, and individual donations have allowed us to provide support to many groups and situations that have arisen through 2023 including financial aid to the Gananoque Pride Alliance, menstrual products and financial aid to Lanark Interval House, and financial assistance to local food banks to name a few.

We continued with the Coalition of Angels project that we began for the Christmas Season in 2022. St. Luke's acts as a conduit between donors and families in need. All monies donated to the Coalition of Angels are passed on in the form of cash, gas gift cards, or grocery gift cards, depending on the individual family's wishes. In 2023 \$14,889.45 was raised and \$14,150.00 was distributed to help families in our community. The balance has is been carried over for clergy discretionary expenses for 2024, so it will be used to provide assistance in our community. We hope that this project will be back in 2024.

Our parish continues to provide refugee support through AGAPE Brockville. We welcomed a new family this past year and we are expecting another refugee family from Somalia shortly.. St. Luke's hosted a highly successful fundraising gala for AGAPE in the fall. We raised \$10,243.

Truth and Reconciliation

Our Sunday morning worship now begins with a land acknowledgement, recognising the first peoples who did and still call our region home. As settlers on this land, we recognise the harm that was caused by our forebears and still continues today through institutional discrimination and the lack of knowledge and understanding of the first peoples. It is our responsibility to learn the stories of the peoples of our region who continue to live and work here.

With the help of the Reach Grant that we received from the Diocese, we were able to expand our truth and reconciliation activities. We have expanded our Truth and Reconciliation library, including the addition of a picture book for children. Our donations to the All Our Relations Land Trust assisted them with the purchase of an off grid irrigation system. We also sponsored presentations at local school by indigenous author Rick Revelle. We now have an indigenous version of our Parish logo created by Kaitlyn Cousineau, an indigenous artist from Port Colborne, which we have incorporated in our truth and reconciliation buttons and use on our Facebook page. We have applied for a Stretch Grant from the Diocese to expand on this work. In 2024 we are looking for ways to add advocacy to our cost of living and community outreach and stewardship. Much of what we have done in the past has been a reaction to a situation. We are hoping to find ways to move society to change in order to prevent, or at least lessen, the challenges faced by our fellow people.

Volunteers

Without our 60 volunteers we would not be able to accomplish as much as we do. If they worked an average of 5 per week at \$20 an hour:

- 15,000 volunteer hours per year (allowing for two weeks off)
- equivalent payroll would be \$300,000

We'd like to thank everyone that volunteers their time to God's service and the work of the parish as well as our many donors. We could not continue our important ministries without you. We would encourage you all to continue and ask the rest of you to prayerfully consider how you might be able to give of yourselves to allow us to continue our service.

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INCUMBENT'S ANNUAL REPORT TO VESTRY FOR 2023: Anglican Parish of Leeds Rear, for February 24th, 2024 meeting

"For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven."

Ecclesiastes 3:1

I'm really not sure where to start in reflecting on the year that was 2023. While COVID-19 seemed to be less of a burden with no shutdowns or imposed restrictions, the cumulative weight of our changed world was influencing our capacity to resume pre-pandemic activities with the same energy and expectation. I think we got older a lot faster than anticipated – at least I noticed more grey hair! And with growing older, we said good-bye to some of our dearest loved ones as they we're received into Christ's mercy and "into the glorious company of the saints in light" (BAS).

But we live in hope – not in spite of our grief – but because our grief is rooted in love and faith. Without love, there would be no grief. Without the faithful example of our loved ones, there would be no legacy of their gifts for us to honour. A most beautiful expression of honouring their legacy was how the congregations of the parish came together to support each other, our communities, and wider needs. St. Luke's set an example for other parishes on modelling efforts towards action for Truth & Reconciliation and inclusion of 2SLGBTQIA+ individuals. We expanded our food security programs to meet the needs of the more vulnerable in our villages. St. Luke's knocked it out of the ballpark in the organization of a highly successful Agape Brockville Refugee Support Fundraising Gala, raising over \$10,250. And then before Christmas, raising over \$14,000 to support families in need through our partnership with Coalition of Angels. When we listen to the Spirit and boldly go where the Spirit is leading us to serve, God will provide.

While there may be a tendency to wring our hands and lament what is to become of the

Anglican Church in our local communities and beyond, Jesus Christ shows us a path of hope, one where there is no expectation of staying the same but rather an opportunity to be transformed. We think we are afraid of change, but we have been changing every second since God knew us in our mothers' wombs. When we embrace change, we can boldly go forward where the Spirit leads, trusting that God will provide all we need for our journey.

In Ecclesiastes 3 it speaks of "a time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted". It is never an either plant or pluck up, but always both/and. As we go forward into 2024, our financial forecast and parish statistics may pull us towards what we need to "pluck up" but we mustn't lose sight of how we are called to plant love, hope, peace and justice in our part of God's garden. Remember how you were first inspired to follow Jesus, to serve in faith; remember the saints who encouraged you, taught you and gave you the confidence to both succeed and make mistakes as you grew as a disciple of Jesus Christ. Then honour their legacy and inspire your neighbour and new generations to be the body of Christ bringing hope and healing into the world.

I wish to extend my sincerest appreciation to our Wardens Susan and Donna. Your steadfast faith and leadership are an inspiration. Thank you for all you sacrifice to proclaim the good news of God's kingdom in our Parish. Thank you to everyone who volunteers, leads, prays and offers their gifts for our ministries you are living examples of our commitment to Jesus's new commandment that we love one another just as he has loved us. I am grateful to my spouse, the Rev. Canon Reg Gilbert, for being our honorary associate, bringing his many gifts to worship when called upon. And my deep appreciate to the Rev Canon Nancy MacLeod: for sharing your innumerable gifts, for your patience, and for your living example of "prayer without ceasing".

PRIEST ASSOCIATE'S ANNUAL REPORT TO VESTRY FOR 2023: Anglican Parish of Leeds Rear February 24, 2024 meeting

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I have called you by name, you are mine; I have gifted you and ask you now to shine. I will not abandon you; all my promises are true. You are gifted, called, and chosen; you are mine. (from 'I Have Called You By Name' by Charles Damon, #24 in 'Sing a New Creation')

Thank you to each and every one of our parish members and volunteers who hears that call and shares their gifts to make possible our ministry and mission. How wonderful that God is with us through it all, and what a privilege it is to offer our lives back to God in service!

My prayer life has been enriched this year by the devotional practice shared by The Sisterhood of St. John the Divine - Anglican Prayer Beads in the colours of a traditional Indigenous Medicine Wheel. We are invited to pray in reflection on the Seven Traditional Teachings common to many Indigenous cultures - Wisdom, Love, Respect, Courage, Honesty, Humility and Truth. I pray for these teachings or gifts to grow in my own life and in all the situations I feel called to pray about. I'd like to reflect on our parish life in light of our call to live into these seven teachings, which share so much in common with familiar teachings of Christian faith.

Growing in **Wisdom** is something we can't just do alone. Listening to each other in our councils is vital, as is deep and ongoing conversation with the wider community as we discern how we are best called to serve. How can we make opportunities and share resources for more of our worship community, and for the wider community we serve, to engage in ways that lead to increase in Wisdom? What voices are missing in seeking more comprehensive understanding? What Wisdom do you have to share with us all?

Love, we are told in 1st Corinthians 13, is the greatest! We see this love demonstrated in the care and prayer we offer for those who are suffering, those who are in need, and those who are mourning amongst us, in our desire to reach out to serve those we don't even know, but whom God loves, and in our deep care for God's creation. How have you felt Love lived in our life together? Who is not being held in our circle of Love, and how might we better extend our circle of Love?

We spell the ways we honour each other as **Respect.** We are blessed to have a parish life that values respectful interactions with each other. How might we grow in demonstrating our Respect of those who differ in opinion, background, ability or any other way? How are we called to live with Respect for 'all our relations' in the vast goodness of God's creation?

Our calling requires enormous **Courage.** We have faced so many challenges, not least in pandemic time, and it seems inescapable that we are going to face many more. How can we support and enCourage each other in making decisions that may be uncomfortable and when we can't yet imagine where those decisions will lead? How can we gently care for those who have lost Courage? How can we help to sustain our own Courage in the midst of an often troubling world?

It can be tempting to avoid difficult conversations and situations because of the discomfort they cause, but **Honesty** is vital to our common life. What are some of the concerns that we need to Honestly wrestle with now? How do we ensure that we are always graceful and kind as we share from our own perspective and listen to the perspective of others?

The word **Humility** reminds us of our connection to the earth, the 'humus', and the need to be grounded. Are we doing all we can to Humbly care for the earth? What does Humility look life in our life of prayer and in our life of service?

In John 14 Jesus tells us that he is the **Truth.** How do we deepen our relationship with our Lord so that we are not tempted by all the other things that claim to be truth - be it politics, money, power . . ., so that we judge everything in the light of the Truth of our faith?

I feel so blessed to be able to share this calling to Christian faith and service in partnership with Rev. Trish and with all of you. May God, who richly gifts us, find delight in the ways we shine!

As you will note from the financial statement, St. Luke's Leeds pastoral care team fills a wide range of roles, from friendly in-home and telephone visits, to the distribution of Christmas goodies, meal preparation and delivery, the various in-home and transportation assistance given by Helping Hands volunteers, and offering the assistive devices lending cupboard. The team is composed of ten volunteers who serve in one or more of those capacities.

The assistive devices lending cupboard has over 50 pieces of equipment in storage at the end of 2023, with at least 83 devices, from wheelchairs to bath chairs, currently on loan at no cost or time limit for borrowing. Please call 613-540-1684 if you or someone you know is in need of assistance or has equipment to offer.

St. Luke's Meals to Go program operates from ReNew Creation thrift shop. Brown bag lunches, dehydrated soups and frozen meals are available when the shop is open from Wednesday to Saturday. Meals are delivered weekly by pastoral care volunteers. Approx. 60 meals per week are distributed in these ways to anyone who requests, with clients from all 6 villages in the area, local schools and transients passing through Elgin.

In 2023 Helping Hands volunteers were mostly busy with offering transportation to medical and other appointments; eight drivers offer their service in this way. Other requests came for meal preparation and delivery, and assistance in various home repairs. One hundred fifty-four requests requiring approx. 470 volunteer hours were answered by the volunteers, approx. 80 % of which were calls for transportation. These calls require an average of 3 hours each; if you would like to volunteer your time and a vehicle, please call the Ministry Centre at 613-507-3311 and leave a message to that effect.

Service in the pastoral care ministry is a very rewarding activity and has opportunities for training in various capacities, as St. Luke's has a good working relationship with Country Roads

health centre and our clergy team is always willing to offer their services to that end. Safe church training is also offered regularly, both in-person and online.

On behalf of the parish, I would like to offer our heartfelt to all those volunteers who serve in this ministry.

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STEWARDSHIP TEAM REPORT

The autumn of 2023 was a busy season for St. Luke's Leeds stewardship team. It began by assisting with St. Luke's Agape gala in early September, followed by the parish Truth and Reconciliation week activities, the week of annual approach meals and conversations in early October, and ending with the Coalition of Angels project through the late fall, among the other one-day events happening through Advent.

A word about those activities: Please refer to the Agape report and the financial statement for the results of the Agape gala, so successfully spear-headed by the Rev. Trish and the Rev. Canon Nancy. The report for the 2023 Truth and Reconciliation activities follows this report. The annual approach to parish members included the stewardship package and 3 parish fellowship meals which resulted in very helpful conversations to assist the stewardship team in rewriting the Ministry and Mission plan in 2024. During the approach, nine Intention cards, with 8 volunteer offers and a total of over \$25,000. In intended offering in 2024, were returned on Intention Sunday or shortly after. Finally, please see the Coalition of Angels report elsewhere in this circular.

The stewardship team meets monthly throughout the year to plan and organize parish activities and to monitor the implementation of the Ministry and Mission Plan. As noted above, 2024 will see the creation of a new Ministry and Mission plan. If you are interested in joining the team

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COALITION OF ANGELS REPORT

The Coalition of Angels project is a Christmas project which began in 2022 with St. Luke's partnering with a local couple who wanted to assist families and individuals in need over the Christmas season. In this project, funds are collected from local folks who wish to contribute and distributed by St. Luke's to families and individuals identified by the local schools, health centres and food banks. In 2023, the number of families identified doubled from 2022; nevertheless, all those families and several individuals received from \$100. to \$500. each, depending on numbers in the household. Thirty-nine households, consisting of 151 individuals were assisted over the Christmas season in this way. Twenty-five identified donors, including 2 sister churches and 2 other organizations contributed to the totals you will note in the financial statement at the end of this circular. Several collection jars in the community also offered opportunities to donate . St. Luke's contributed \$500. from thrift shop funds, as well as organizing and arranging for the distribution of funds.

On behalf of the parish, I would like to offer our profound thanks to the couple who suggested and worked so hard to promote this highly successful program for the community. 2023 TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION REPORT

St. Luke's Leeds is committed to supporting and living into the Calls to Action published in the national Truth and Reconciliation Report. The parish focused especially on Call to Action #59, which calls for churches to act to educate their local communities about the necessity for truth-telling and reconciliation. The parish was blessed to receive a Reach grant from the Diocese of Ontario in 2023 which funded approx. 80% of its Truth and Reconciliation activities. (Please see the report for the Reach grant, prepared by the Rev. Trish Miller, which follows this report.)

Funds from the Reach grant allowed St. Luke's to start an indigenous-themed lending library at the ReNew Creation thrift shop which currently has 50 books and at least 51 borrows in 2023. The parish acknowledged the National Indigenous Day of Prayer in June with a worship service outdoors in Elgin, and another worship service Orange shirt day. During national Truth and Reconciliation week in September, the parish sponsored a full-day presentation and lunch at Rideau D.H.S. and a half day presentation at Sweet's Corners elementary school, as well as an indigenous-themed lunch and afternoon presentation at the community hall in Elgin, all led by indigenous knowledge-keeper and author Rick Revelle.

Through those and other educational and cultural presentations, St. Luke's reached directly at least 600 folks in our community, established a relationship with All Our Relations Indigenous land trust in the east end of Kingston, and assisted indigenous performers in reaching the wider community in the Gananoque area. The parish has applied for a Stretch grant from the diocese in 2024, with which it hopes to continue the educational efforts begun in 2023.

REACH GRANT: TRUTH & RECONCILIATION

In January 2023, St. Luke's Leeds made an application for a \$5000 Reach Grant to support our commitment to Truth and Reconciliation, specifically to raise awareness for Truth & Reconciliation in our rural communities that don't have access to resources and activities as more urban centres do. Our Reach Grant application was in direct response to Call to Action #59 which states: "We call upon church parties to the Settlement Agreement to develop ongoing education strategies to ensure that their respective congregations learn about their church's role in colonization, the history and legacy of residential schools, and why apologies to former residential school students, their families, and communities were necessary."

In our successful 2023 Reach Grant proposal we committed to establishing a reconciliation lending library, offer cultural presentations on Algonquin culture to the community and schools, host a PWRDF mapping exercise, prayer services in June and September for National Indigenous Day of Prayer, and support the First People's Performing Arts Festival in Gananoque in September. Our total budget for T&R Awareness was \$6070. In total we expended \$6334.07 on the following:

- \$2,500.00 First People Performing Arts Festival
- \$ 200.00 Indigenous artwork for parish logo
- \$ 315.23 books for lending library
- \$ 139.84 purchase from Indigenous Face Masks
- \$1,000.00 donation to All Our Relations Land Trust
- \$1,000.00 meals at RDHS
- \$1,125.00 Rick Revelle presentations
- \$ 54.00 buttons

St. Luke's Leeds deeply appreciated the Reach Grant we were awarded in 2023. We were encouraged by our outreach and contributions to raising Truth & Reconciliation Awareness in our local communities. We strengthened relationships with existing indigenous groups and forged new relationships that offer even greater opportunities for raising awareness.

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RE-NEW CREATION ST. LUKE'S THRIFT SHOP 2023 ANNUAL ACTIVITY REPORT

VOLUNTEERS:

Our volunteers continue to be very engaged and work hard to keep the shop successful. While we lost one of our regular volunteers, we have brought on two new ones who have fit in nicely.

SALES:

Once again there was a significant increase in sales revenue in 2023 (38% increase in total sales over 2022). Average weekly sales in 2022 were \$947.21 compared to \$1189.84 in 2022. A contributing factor was the fact that the shop was closed until February 9th in 2022.

Average sales per day were similar in 2023 with Saturday having the highest average sales, followed closely by Friday, Wednesday then Thursday.

FACEBOOK PAGE:

Compared to this time in 2022, we have 48% more followers - 93% who identified themselves as female. The largest group is still between the ages of 55 to 64. Most of the followers are in Canada however we have 7 who are in the United States and one from Myanmar. 29% are from Elgin, 13% from Lyndhurst, 8% from Kingston and Athens, with the remainder located in Westport, Brockville, Gananoque, Ottawa, Smiths Falls and Perth.

THRIFT SHOP REORGANIZATION:

We continue to make improvements to the thrift shop organization. The largest project undertaken was building a wall to separate the shop from the storage/work area. This allowed for a slightly larger area in the back with improved storage options. The volunteers have expressed their appreciation of the improvements. At the same time, additional shelving was purchased or constructed in the shop itself. We have received many positive comments from customers on how much they like the changes. This project was completed during the week between Christmas and New Year's when the shop was closed. Many of our volunteers came in to assist as well as several other individuals who gave us some time. There was no cost to the thrift shop for any of the work.

Several new or used clothing racks were purchased in 2023. Two were placed in the men's clothing section and one in the children's clothing section.

LUNCH 2 GO/MEALS 2 GO PROGRAMS:

The bag lunches and meals from the freezer continue to be very popular. Customers have been very happy to be offered the choice of a sandwich lunch or entrees such as lasagna, vegetable noodle soup, stews, etc. As well, we have available a selection of dry soup mixes in jars which can be cooked at home.

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KIVA and ST. LUKE'S

Kiva is an international non-profit organization founded in 2005 and based in San Francisco, with a mission to connect people through microloans to low income entrepreneurs and students to alleviate poverty.

We started with a Jug campaign in the summer of 2011, and with topping up brought our total collections up to date to \$1078 American

We have been making loans for almost 13 years, and during that time our contributions have made 121 loans to 60 countries for a loan total of \$3400 American! We have also contributed to the work of Kiva with each loan we make. Kiva loans have a very good percentage of repayment (96.8%) so our pot keeps filling up again.

The loans we have made have been slightly over half to women (56%), have been to all parts of the world, and have covered needs ranging from Agriculture, to arts and crafts, education, health, transportation and beyond. Our last loan was made just a few weeks ago to a woman in Tonga to expand her weaving business.

If anyone is interested in donating to this outreach project directly, let me know and I will "invite" you to join our St. Luke's team. Although a small one, this is one of the ways we expand our outreach as a Parish to the world. I find it very interesting reading the stories of those who request our donations to their loans, and following the updates Kiva give.

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AGAPE BROCKVILLE

Agape Brockville is a refugee sponsorship group representing three churches and other volunteers whose purpose is to bring UNHCR refugees to Canada and support them financially and otherwise for one year. Since 2015, the group has sponsored four families, two originally from Eritrea, one from Syria, and one from Somalia.

2023 began with a large group of volunteers cleaning and moving furniture and many other household items into a home in Brockville at the end of January, in preparation for the Al Nasser family's arrival. The Al Nassers were originally from Syria but were living in a refugee camp in Lebanon. This family of four includes father Fahed, mother Alaa, 8-year-old Omar, and 4-year-old Amir who has severe cognitive and physical disabilities. Due to Amir's fragile health, the family's flight was postponed several times. Finally, on May 19th, they arrived safely in Ottawa where they were met by family members and members of Agape, and taken to their new home in Brockville. The mother of the other Syrian family previously sponsored by Agape, Samar, is Fahed's sister, so the new arrivals had excellent family support close by. The Al Nassers have settled in well. Omar is going to school in his neighbourhood and Amir is receiving wonderful medical care.

There are two other families that Agape members continue to pray for in anticipation that they will be able to come to Canada. There is a Somali family of four in a refugee camp in Ethiopia. They only need medical exams before getting visas, but this can take a long time. There is also the Eritrean family of Abdurahman who were refugees in Sudan for many years. In July they

fled the dire situation there and crossed the Sahara Desert over three days to Egypt where they would make a refugee claim.

A highlight of the year was the Fundraising Gala hosted by St. Luke's and Leeds Anglican Ministries on September 8th at Furnace Falls Farm. The event included a dinner, several musical performers, and a silent auction. It was a very successful evening and over \$10,000 was raised for Agape. Thanks once again to all the local businesses and individuals who hosted, performed, donated, and attended. And to our planning team!

As of December 31, 2023, expenses for the Al Nasser family totaled \$24,240.09. Agape's yearend closing balance was \$49,935.18. 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THE ANGLICAN REGIONAL MINISTRY OF NORTH LEEDS (LEEDS ANGLICAN MINISTRIES) REPORT TO ANNUAL VESTRY MEETINGS FOR 2023

Stronger Together In Christ

Leeds Anglican Ministries was born out of the desire to explore new ways of living our Christian faith that went beyond the unsustainable model of one congregation or parish being served by one clergy person in effective isolation from the wider church. Although the long period of pandemic certainly thwarted our efforts to live into our motto of being Stronger Together in Christ, this past year has seen us working to recover and strengthen our relationships and the ministry they enable.

Our Diocesan Synod gave our LAM Members of Synod the opportunity, under the guidance of Bishop Susan Bell of the Diocese of Niagara, to explore how we can really plan for Mission. The discussions there were brought back first to our 'LAM Shepherds' team, the group who gather as representatives of our five congregations, as well as St. Paul's Anglican Community Centre. From that gathering we undertook to widen the conversation to include all our Parish Advisory Councils and all members of our congregations. This has been important and potentially lifegiving work, and we encourage you to ensure that it not simply be dropped, but continues to inspire us in our planning.

A particular highlight of the year was the September Gala celebration at Furnace Falls Farms for the benefit of AGAPE Refugee Support. Thanks to the hands-on leadership of St. Luke's folks and support from all of LAM we raised over \$10,000 to help make a new life in Canada possible for a soon-to-arrive family.

As we move forward, it will continue to be important to share in worship and fellowship together to strengthen our relationships. Please be sure that you make time for these opportunities, and please share your insights with you congregation's 'Shepherds' so that our Regional Ministry may bear much good fruit for our Lord

- Provide Cemetery Memorial worship for St. John's Cemetery, and other local Cemeteries as requested
- Encourage congregational input for worship planning and leadership, and diverse lay worship roles
- Provide pastoral and sacramental offices including rites of passage and healing ministry
- Promote LAM Regional and ecumenical gatherings and worship

DISCIPLESHIP After Jesus had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. (John 13:12-15) We will:

- Nurture and teach disciples to be rooted in Christ, inclusive of all people, concerned for creation and giving glory to God by growth in grace and knowledge
- Provide opportunities and resources for individuals to discern their spiritual gifts
- Encourage the Holy use of time, including regular sabbath rest
- Provide year-round opportunities for members to offer their time, talents and treasure, including a specific annual intention
- Encourage active participation in wider Anglican, Ecumenical and Interfaith levels and programs
- Provide appropriate training and financial support to lay leaders for ministry and mission
- Equip individuals and families as stewards of creation, including sharing opportunities for Creation Care advocacy/activism
- Support children's and youth ministries including seasonal activity bags and events and bursary support
- Live into the Truth and Reconciliation process and act in accordance with the "Calls to Action"

MINISTRY "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. ... A Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. - Encourage the strengthening and growth of Leeds Anglican Ministries
- Provide ordained ministry within Leeds Anglican Ministries based on a written covenant

- Strengthen, grow and support the pastoral care team, coordinating this ministry with St. Luke's Helping Hands ministry and Assistive Devices Lending Cupboard, and partnering with the community to best provide these related ministries

- Emphasize prayer through prayer chain, healing prayer and intentional prayer
- Serve others by reaching out and responding to local and wider needs
- Partner with the community in enabling St. Luke's Re-new Creation Thrift Shop ministry
- Offer meal support through St. Luke's Meals to Go
- Continue the care of St. John's Leeds cemetery

- Welcome newcomers and respond to their needs
- Be attentive to all aspects of inclusiveness and value diversity

- Explore possibilities for community-building social activities within LAM and local communities

<u>MISSION</u> (Jesus said) you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8) We will:

- Honour and build on the previous LAM Diocesan Ministry Task Force Covenant
- Support a four-level ministry / mission approach community, diocesan, national and global
- Utilize connections with local schools and organizations for mission opportunities
- Expand our social media and public presence to make ourselves and LAM better known
- Support local food security and affordable housing initiatives
- Operate our Thrift Shop, with a significant portion of the proceeds designated for outreach
- Expand outreach ministries as we discern needs, and nurture partnerships with like-minded organizations to serve the wider community
- Continue our partnership in the Agape Brockville Refugee Support Group

- Share stewardship resources and experience within LAM and the Diocese
- Continue adherence to Safe Church policy
- Continue and expand assessment of all parish facilities and practices for safety, accessibility, maintenance and environmental impact
- Model and encourage an attitude of gratitude and generosity
